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What Authority?



In Term 2 students in Year 7 at Normanhurst Boys' High School looked at the life of Jesus, learning about key concepts, such as the truth of the Gospels, our need for repentance, and Jesus' claim to be God.

This last concept was a lesson on **authority**, where after seeing Jesus show his **authority over the natural world (through calming a storm), and the supernatural world (through casting out demons)**, we looked at the healing of the paralyzed man in Luke 5:17-21. It was great to see the boys really grasping the concept that by

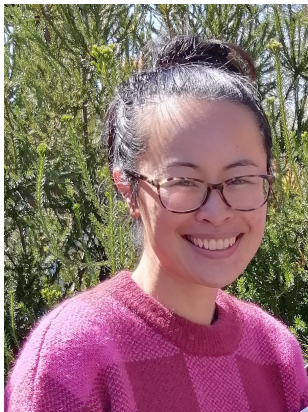
claiming to have authority to forgive sins, Jesus made the big claim that he is in fact, God, which he then demonstrated by doing the harder thing, and healing the paralyzed man. This unit culminated in Term 3 covering Jesus' arrest, execution, resurrection, and ascension.

These concepts were examined further in Year 8, by looking through the cultural lenses of guilt/innocence, shame/honor, and fear/power, introducing students to the concept of worldview. Year 9 students looked at the evidence for Christianity, especially the resurrection. While in Year 10 students began to observe religions through the perspective of worldview, seeing how different worldviews answer the questions; "What is the problem?" and "What is the solution?" Islam, Judaism, and Christianity are covered as religious worldviews, alongside Atheism as a non-religious worldview.

Please pray that these lessons will help the students see Jesus' authority as God, and how Christianity stands out as the one, true, authoritative, worldview.

First Impressions!



What are our first impressions of someone? How accurate are they? Having passed halfway of their first year of high school, Year 7 students at Hornsby Girls' reflected on their first impressions of teachers, "They're not that strict!" and peers, "Generally, everyone's nice".

We then applied these questions to their first impressions of Jesus. What three words do they associate with Jesus? Responses ranged from 'deceiving', 'gullible' and 'mysterious', to 'kind', 'holy' and 'friend.' **For some students, their impressions were limited to a stereotypical picture of a bearded man**

with flowing robes whilst others knew Jesus in a personal way. In our subsequent lessons, students were challenged to examine their first impressions of Jesus by looking at what the Bible says about him. We explored topics including Jesus' family and childhood, Jesus' uniqueness as a teacher and his miracles.

Students were then invited to reflect on whether anything changed in their thinking about Jesus. One student wrote, **"The physical description has changed to some personality adjectives. I know more about him."** It was encouraging to see many students beginning to shift from their preconceived ideas of Jesus to a more biblical view.

Dane Ortlund wrote in his book 'Deeper,' "Explore uncharted regions of who [Jesus] is. Resist the tendency... to whittle him down to our preconceived expectation of what he must be like. Let him surprise you. Let his fullness arrest you and buoy you along." **Please pray for this reality in the students' lives and mine.**
